Legacy, dir. Daniel Kazankov (Slovakia) 2019, 21'

Igor is a Russian who left his homeland for a better life in Czechoslovakia. He feels lonely in the new reality. He decides to commit suicide, but first, he needs to settle unfinished business. Polish premiere.

Koselig (noun/verb), dir. Cassie LeFevre (USA) 2020, 10'

Alecko, an American director, tries to bring his compatriots closer to the idea of Slow TV, which he is fascinated with. The longest film made in this form lasted 134 hours. Alecko wants to break this record. Polish premiere.

An Unique Opportunity, dir. Joël Curtz (France) 2019, 14'

It's summer. Lazare picks up two hitchhikers who make him change his plans. Film presented e.g. at Clermont-Ferrand ISFF and Rotterdam IFF. Polish premiere.

Marcel, dir. Marcin Mikulski (Poland) 2019, 26'

Marcel loves his life, because nobody notices him. The ticket inspector doesn't check his ticket, the boss doesn't bother to glance at him at work, people snog in front of him in the lift... Unfortunately, his ideal world will turn upside down on a cloudy summer day. And it will only get worse. Audience Award at the FF Opolskie Lamy.

FOCUS: EMOTIONS PT. 1

The Focus: Emotions competition is devoted to short dramas that evoke strong emotions in the audience. Sorrow mixes with joy, excitement with powerlessness, and sometimes, it brings out some tears. This cinema from all around the world makes us realise that although our cultures often differ, we are very similar when it comes to emotions.

Homesick, dir. Koya Kamura (France) 2018, 27'

Two years have passed since the Fukushima disaster. Murai systematically traverses the restricted zone in search of an important souvenir. A woman, learning about his expeditions, asks him for an unusual favor. Film awarded at the Hollyshorts festival.

My Heart, dir. Damian Kocur (Poland) 2019, 30'

Rozalia is an actress. A professional opportunity makes it essential for her to move from Warsaw to Wałbrzych. The new city means a long-term contract of employment for her in the local theatre and a new school for her son, Kazik. As they settle in, Rozalia begins to strike up a friendship with Kazik's new teacher, Darek and prepares for a new performance. Unexpected events in Rozalia's life become intertwined with her onstage role.

Mina, dir. Woogeon Park (Republic of Korea) 2018, 23'

Mina is a troubled teenager at school. One day a befriended policeman shows up in her apartment with the news that someone who has done her great harm, wants to meet her.

Sole Mio, dir. Maxime Roy (France) 2019, 23'

The 25-year-old Daniel manages the family business. Few years ago, his father left his mother and moved to another city. Unlike her son, the woman doesn't know the real reason for this decision. Daniel starts to get weighted down by his father's secret and decides to pay him a secret visit.

The Gift of All, dir. Marco Q Wu, Joe Lee (Taiwan) 2019, 23'

Ko-Ching aspires to be an influential streamer, with the support of her best friend Jia-Ling. Meeting with the internet celebrity, Hsiao-Hsuan, brings the girl closer to her desired goal. Ko-Ching becomes famous, but she will have to pay a big price for it.

European premiere.

Blue Flower, dir. Saadi Constantine (Switzerland) 2020, 27'

Ana and Amara, a young couple from Bucharest take a radical decision. In order to finance the treatment of Leo, their 3-year-old son suffering from an under-oxygenation of the brain, Ana is going to work as a cam-girl. In this film, the actors play their own role and all the places are authentic.

Adele is an aggressive 17-year-old girl who spends most of her time "trolling" her classmates online. When she is hit on by Uri, they start to flirt. The boy wants to see her photo. Adele sends Uri a picture of a random girl from Syria, sparking another unexpected relationship.

Grandma's Day, dir. Ewa Ślusarczyk (Poland) 2019, 18'

83-year-old Kristin explores the secrets of social media and proves to skeptics that it is never too late to learn.

Poland in the near future. Behind the bars of a gated community, under the watchful eye of CCTV, a peculiar game takes place. We observe a world where weapons are legal, bullets can be bought at a petrol station, and people's lives are ruled by frontier justice enforced by the state. Two girls become embroiled in a feud between neighbouring families. Is it possible to reject the rules that govern a culture of revenge, violence and terror?

A fisherman is left alone on the shore of a dried out sea. He is stuck in the past, until a sandstorm overtakes him and redefines the meaning of his existence...

Anna lives in comfortable loneliness until she becomes the object of lust of a neighbor from the window opposite. Violence breaks into her life.

Circles and Triangles, dir. Darya Trublina, Varvara Lavrova (Russian Federation) 2019, 3'

HARSH REALITY

A documentary can be a distanced observation of a fragment of reality, an attempt to understand a phenomenon or an intimate original statement. Although this is just a beginning of the endless possibilities. Those approaches are presented in the Harsh Reality screening. The authors of the selected films undertake difficult, and sometimes controversial topics, where it is not easy to stay indifferent.

Halo Effect, dir. Patrycja Polkowska (Poland) 2019, 14'

Studzieniec is an open youth detention centre, resembling a compulsory summer camp rather than a highsecurity prison. In places like this, the residents are not given sentences in years. They cannot leave until the day of their 21 st birthday. They stay in touch with the outer world mainly by use of a landline phone in the supervisor's room.

Letter to my mother, dir. Amin Maher (Iran) 2019, 20'

Amin Maher starred with his mother in Abbas Kiarostami's *10*. The famous film became the beginning of a career, but also a nightmare. In a letter to his mother, Maher reveals the most painful secrets from his childhood.

My Country So Beautiful, dir. Grzegorz Paprzycki (Poland) 2019, 30'

A documentary portrait of Poland, in which two forces clash representing completely different worldviews. The left wing vision of the country, against the homogeneous Poland built by the extreme right. Among these ideologies - people who fight in the name of their own values and principles. There is one main disagreement - nationalism.

Two young friends, Nissen and Sender, vow that if their children are of opposite sex, they will get married. Sender's daughter Lea gets born, and Nissen's son Chonen is born. Lea's mother dies in childbirth, and Nissen dies at the currents of the river while returning from a journey... *The Dybbuk* is the first full-length movie in Poland recorded entirely in Yiddish language.

Mother Mariam is the last christian in the village where muslims and christians have been living together for many years. One day the woman dies, and muslim villagers wonder how to bury her according to the rules of her religion.

Smoky Mountain, dir. Albert Oriol (France) 2019, 20'

Sony, the 8-year-old Cambodian, lives off what he can find at the landfill site. When his father throws him out of the house, the charity institution takes him in. Now he seems to have everything that he was deprived of before...

European premiere.

The Wake, dir. Riad Bouchoucha (France) 2019, 24'

Salim returns to his family house to collect money for his mother's funeral. He feels like a stranger in a crowd of his religious relatives. The day before the funeral his prodigal brother Imad shows up. Film presented e.g. at ISFF in Clermont-Ferrand.

All on a Mardi Gras Day, dir. Michal Pietrzyk (USA) 2019, 23'

Demond lives in the worst district of New Orleans. Throughout the year, he sews a feathered outfit in which he will perform as the Great Chief at the Mardi Gras parade, celebrated the day before Ash Wednesday.

It's an unprecedented event– Czuła Obserwacja invites you to its Sound Lab! They will play music for the films, but this time directly in the place where it is made, where they feel like a fish in the water and where many things have happened since 1909 (the founding of the Kamienica Cudów). During the online concert, they will create the musical setting for Winsor McCay's avant-garde animations. The band returns to the film material they faced on the LFF stage in the first year of their activity. Since then, they have managed to define a style and create their own sound system. They want to show it to you!

About Czuła Obserwacja:

The band was founded in 2017 for the purpose of composing and performing live music to Alfred Hitchcock's silent film *Champagne*. In the last 3 years, they have repeated this process about 20 times, creating music to *The Blood of Poet* by J. Cocteau, Winsor McCay's avant-garde animations, *Nanook of the North* and films made by G. Mielies, E.S. Porter, R. Wienie, Lotte Reiniger. Over time, they have developed activities unrelated to cinema. Czuła Obserwacja often performs and records in collaboration with music and art personalities in a broader context, using a variety of variable sets of instruments. This allows the use of a varied sound palette, unique loops prepared individually for each performance, and the use of a selection from a wide range of instruments. The music for the films performed by the band is characterized by psychological clarity and whimsical spirituality. The band uses the method of observation and emphasizes with their compositions and improvisations the weirdness, cosmic distance and the omnipresent mocking hyperboles of meaning. It illustrates not only the film itself, but rather the spectator's state, self-reference on the verge of fear and amusement with the oddity he observes.

Agu Gurczyńska – she has been present in the last few years at formal and informal music sessions, where she develops her individual approach to singing. She often uses a self-invented language, in which she sings, and looped phrases, sometimes transformed so much that they do not resemble the sounds of a human voice. She has also collaborated with the Tatvamasi band and the NoBody collective.

Łukasz Downar – musician and philosopher, bassist of the bands Do Świtu Grali, Cukierkotki, Starcy, Klezmaholics and Tatvamasi, with which he has released 6 albums so far and has played, among others, in Berlin, Prague, Vienna, Paris, Budapest, Lviv, Kazimierz Dolny on the Vistula and many places in Poland. Currently, he is constantly expanding the sound of his original project with Agnieszka Gurczyńska, which is Czuła Obserwacja.

Struggling with autism, Oleg sees his work as a watchmaker as a form of therapy. An orderly life helps him keep the balance. His neighbour, Katja, is the complete opposite of order and balance. She becomes interested in him and that means trouble for both of them.
